Finance

It is the mission and responsibility of the Trinity Finance Committee to assist the Vestry, hence the family of Trinity, by matching available resources with projected expenditures so as to accomplish priorities as manifested through worship, stewardship of facilities, outreach and a myriad of other activities deemed appropriate by the Vestry.

Members of the Finance Committee are: Toonie Waddell, Kim Davis, CT Ponder, Lee Bettis, Tom Edwards, and Ralph Wagoner. Other invited participants this year have been the Rev. Donna Gerold, the Rev. Eric Zile and Gary Ulrich, Senior Warden. Participation of the members and clergy is vital if we are to maximize participation and potential.

The 2020 Fiscal Year budget has been completed and submitted to the Vestry; it will be presented at the Annual Meeting on December 8.

This fiscal year 2019 has been one of stability mixed with some significant change. Stability in as much as the Trinity congregation has been faithful with giving and faithful with maintaining the integrity of their pledges. With exception of a few parishioners who departed mid-year, pledges and regular and plate offerings have exceeded expectations. This is good. Here it is important to offer a personal observation: in my 50+ years of serving on church boards and committees, I have never been associated with a congregation that takes its commitment to the church as seriously and faithfully as does Trinity Episcopal Church, Apalachicola!

We will end the fiscal year in good shape without having touched the Young Fund for anything other than the necessary funds to cover the cost of pastoral transition. The endowment and quasi-endowment funds have shown significant growth coming off a lackluster 2018.

While Tour of Home income was down slightly this year, revenues from this magnificent event undergird the care and upgrades to Trinity's historic facilities.

The budget for FY2020 reflects the continued attention to the recommendations of the Financial Think Group assembled in 2017. Of special note is the increased appropriation for the music program. This has been a conscious effort to provide greater support for this important part of our worship experience. Further, the 2020 budget reflects the full impact of the pastoral transition. Over the years we have carried large year- end cash balances, and this year we will use a portion of said balance to smooth out the 2020 budget. I would emphasize that with transition comes changes of all kinds. This transition has challenged us with new vision and new initiatives but it has reinforced the basic tenant of Trinity: WE WORSHIP. WE WITNESS. WE ACCEPT SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY. WE CARE FOR EACH OTHER.

Endowment

The Endowment/Gift Committee oversees the various church funds that are invested through the Diocese. These include the Trinity Endowment Fund, the Restoration and Preservation Trust, the Young Bequest Fund, the Maintenance Reserve Fund, the Henry and Pearl Marshall Trust, and the Genevieve Marshall Altar Fund. Quarterly reports are distributed to the Vestry.

The assets of Trinity Episcopal Church, Apalachicola, (listed above) as overseen by the Endowment/Gift Committee, continue to be invested through a fund provided by the Diocese.

The Diocese reports investment results on a quarterly basis, cumulative from the first of the year. Therefore, this report is inclusive through the first nine months of 2019. All of our six funds have a positive gain through the third quarter of 2019. Withdrawals have only been taken from the Young Fund to pay for Father Zile's move to Apalachicola. Even with this withdrawal, the Young Fund has a gain of approximately \$35,000 through this first three quarters. Also, of particular note, the Endowment Fund had a \$25,000 contribution during the year and along with investment gains has gone from ~\$7400 to ~\$37,000! Barring any unusual drop in the market in the final three months of the year, it is anticipated that all funds will show a significant increase for the year.

A final accounting will be available once year's end results are in. These will be reported to the vestry and available to anyone upon request.

We give generously of our time and talents and that is as it should be—we are called to be stewards and we are called to be doers.

Church Programs & Committees

Christian Formation

Various opportunities for spiritual growth are available in the Trinity community, including Adult Discussion on Sunday morning, concentrating on the Week's lectionary; Monday School, a book discussion group; Centering Prayer; Education for Ministry, a four year program of adult Christian formation in community using theological education and reflection; Outback Bible Study, a weekly dinner and discussion gathering held in various homes in South Gulf County.

Monday School: 10 am Monday in the Conference Room. Monday school has morphed over time from a confirmation class into a group of people who enjoy reading and discussing a book the group has selected it is open to all.

Education for Ministry: 3 pm Tuesday in the Conference Room. Education for Ministry is a four-year program of adult Christian formation in community using theological education and reflection. The learners commit one year at a time, over the course of the four-year curriculum. Topics of study include the Bible, church history, ethics, and theology. Outback Bible Study: 6:30 pm Thursday Night in various homes. An outgrowth of a foyer group, the Outback has been meeting for over six years in South Gulf County. The size of the group varies weekly from 7 to 20. We have people from several other denominations as well as Trinity, and pastors and priests from several faiths too. We have studied Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, The Acts, Romans, Corinthians, Letters, Psalms, and other relevant books. We even did a flash mob one time at Trinity. Usually we meet socialize, eat, and then discuss. Everybody is welcomed.

Natural Spirituality: 10 am Thursday. Contact Anne Eason.

Tai Chi: 8 am (beginner) & 9 am (experienced) Wednesday in Benedict Hall. Tai Chi, a form of ancient Chinese Martial Art, is a no impact, slow motion body and mind training. Practitioners benefit in the areas of balance, overall muscle tone, lowered stress, and mental clarity.

Chair Yoga: 10 am Wednesday in Benedict Hall. Chair yoga incorporates a variety of stretches, acupressure hand and knee exercises. It alleviates stiffness, improves concentration and balance, calms the mind and body allowing for a greater spiritual connection with God, and creates an overall sense of well-being. Everybody is welcomed where you are at and the classes last for 60 minutes. Donations accepted.

Centering Prayer: 5:15 pm Wednesday, in the Oratory. Centering Prayer is a contemplative prayer practice, inspired by Christian mystics through the centuries. It is a way of praying in silence that, through one's intention, opens the door to the Divine Indwelling, the very ground of our being. It can move one toward a profound relationship with the Spirit of God.

Each gathering consists of a15-minute introductory period for reading of a prayer classic (Christian Meditation by James Finley) followed by a 20-minute period experiencing Centering Prayer. Each Centering session opens and closes with a brief verbal prayer.

Our group participates in the international Contemplative Outreach through the Tallahassee Centering Prayer Facilitators Group. The facilitator, Randy Mims, meets quarterly with them for peer group support and accountability.

Communications

The goal of our communications efforts is to strengthen the commitment and involvement of our congregation, as well as welcome new and diverse members, and increase community involvement, to keep Trinity viable into the next century.

During 2019, the *Bay View*, Trinity's e-newsletter accelerated its publication schedule so that news and information is more current. It now goes out, via email, along with some mail distribution, every other Friday (26 times/year) to 250 Trinity parishioners and friends. Contents include church activities, community service and entertainment opportunities, and photos of members' travel adventures, as well as family visits.

The new *Special News* format, introduced in the Spring, allows for on-demand distribution when we have time-sensitive information to communicate, including timely and urgent notices, including death announcements, parishioner needs/health updates, stewardship reflections, and special services.

Currently, 51% of readers access the *Bay View* on their desktop computers, while 49% read it on their mobile devices.

Our **website**, <u>www.trinityapalachicola.org</u>, serves as a basis for our external communications, and features Trinity's rich history, as well as information on worship and spiritual growth; parish and community life; and, news/special events.

To broaden the reach of our e-newsletter, the *Bay View* is posted on the website; and the weekly bulletins are added to the website in advance of the Sunday services.

Just over 250 visitors/month access the website, viewing 3.5 pages/visit. And 57% of website visitors access the site via internet search engines such as

Google, Yahoo, or Bing. The remaining 43% access the site directly, or from other websites and social media.

Our *Facebook page*, @trinityapalachicola, provides a community-wide presence where we promote traditional events like our Thanksgiving Dinner, Tour of Homes, Pancake Supper, and the Blessing of the Animals, as well as special worship services on the liturgical calendar. We have 337 Facebook followers, including members, friends, and local residents. This year, our posts about the Tour of Homes, Blessing of the Animals, Penny's Worth, Memorial Service notices, and posts featuring our new Priest were the most popular, reaching between 260 & 800 people with each post.

This year, we established and introduced our new, online *Church Directory*, featuring photographs, as well as current contact information. This service enables members to quickly obtain phone numbers, addresses, and emails that will streamline one-on-one communication. With the introduction of mobile apps and a direct computer link, the directory is even more accessible and allows users to call, text, or email directly from the member listings.

Committees can take advantages of our *promotional services*, including posters and news media outreach, when they have events or activities that benefit from public visibility.

Episcopal Church Women (ECW)

Every woman in the Episcopal Church is automatically a member of ECW. At Trinity, there are no dues and only one or two organizational meetings each year. The Episcopal Church Women serve as hostesses for the community at events such as funeral receptions and special meetings. They will lead fund-raising efforts (their own and other groups' efforts). The ECW is a worldwide organization that supports young women in the church through college scholarships.

ECW initiated some structural changes at our January 2019 meeting. Since attendance at monthly meetings has fallen off considerably over the past few years, it was decided that two meetings a year would serve as planning sessions. At the January meeting we made plans for Winter and Spring events, and the September meeting focused on events in the Fall. Also, since we no longer have an established Hospitality or Parish Life ministry, members of ECW have stepped up whenever called upon to make sure that all of our traditional events continue.

In 2019, our two fundraisers were very successful. The TOH luncheon brought in \$3,000 and the Seafood Festival Bake Sale made an additional \$1,300. These efforts allow us to make a number of donations at the end of the year to the church and our community.

Hospitality has always been a hallmark of Trinity Church, and the Episcopal Church Women work hard to assure that we continue that welcoming tradition. We invite all the women of Trinity to join us in 2020. There is a place and a need for all of you.

Memorial Garden

The Memorial Garden is a peaceful and sacred space between Benedict Hall and the Church. It includes a columbarium, plantings, benches, and a pathway with memorial bricks honoring deceased family and friends.

Outreach

The Outreach ministry of Trinity Episcopal Church is dedicated to assist in meeting the needs of those in Franklin County and throughout the Bend Big of Florida. Quarterly meetings, open to all, are held to identify needs and plan accordingly. Trinity's congregation is highly supportive of activities and contributes generously to minister to those in the area.

The Outreach Ministry finished 2018 with the onslaught and ongoing aftermath of Hurricane Michael, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. When Outreach members returned from evacuation, we found Karen Kessel hard at work organizing a temporary day care in Benedict Hall until schools reopened. Children who participated were welcomed back for a children's choir and gave a Christmas performance, followed by a meal together with families and friends.

In May of 2019 money was donated to the Episcopal Church-sponsored Bible School in Panama City. Trinity also made a donation to the Episcopal Relief Fund for hurricane relief and recovery for victims of Michael and Dorian in the Bahamas. Pairing with a local church, Trinity donated monies to remove a tree, blown down by Hurricane Michael, from a house of a needy family.

Trinity also responded by providing cleanup assistance to six parishioners, funded a winter break program for scouts, and bought shoes for the FHCS girls basketball team. A planned Christmas party for residents in the Port St Joe nursing home, had to be postponed and replaced with a "Welcome Home" party in February. Gifts and refreshments were put together and delivered, with music provided by Randy Mims.

In January the scouts' sale of BBQ chicks and butts was more extensively advertised and sold in Apalachicola. Bill Van Der Tulip was able to use Trinity as a pickup site for those picking up BBQ for their Super Bowl parties. A drive to support Big Bend Hospice with Ensure was coordinated by Dee Crusoe and was enthusiastically supported by all.

A spring BBQ dinner at Trinity was held to sponsor summer activities for youth. Monies were used to support scouts, 4-H, and the Matchbox. The scouts were awarded the most merit badges earned at their camp this summer.

In the fall of 2019 the Blessing of the Animals community event was held at Trinity. Father Eric and Annie welcomed many into the church.

In addition to assisting the food bank, Trinity supplied funds for slaw and provided a service opportunity for members for a community Thanksgiving at the Holy Family Community Center.

At Christmas time Trinity again provided additional funds to the food bank and provided assistance to a local family succeeding through difficult times. Bring Me a Book Franklin and Trinity partnered in bringing Christmas to the youngest students at ABC Charter School. After a play put on by the children, Trinity served a meal to all who attended.

Long known as Trinity's face to the community, Penny's Worth Thrift Store celebrated its 28th year. The Penny's Worth ministry is described in detail in a separate section of Trinity's Annual Report.

Parish Life

Penny's Worth

Penny's Worth is a Thrift Shop operated by Trinity, offering the community affordable, slightly used clothing and household items. Proceeds go to Trinity's outreach programs and a variety of local charities.

Penny's Worth continues to be a popular shopping destination for local and regular customers as well as tourists, snowbirds, and shoppers within a 100-mile radius.

As of October 31, Penny's Worth revenues for 2019 totaled \$42,705. Funds are used for maintenance of the Penny's Worth building, donations to Trinity's community outreach efforts, and to Trinity's general operations.

Thanks to all of you who have brought donations in 2019. It is from your donations, and donations from others that Penny's Worth continues to thrive. If you haven't done so lately, please clean out your closets, house, kitchen, attic, garage and even your car, because no matter the status of the economy, business at Penny's Worth continues as usual! Tour of Homes

The Historic Apalachicola Home & Garden Tour, a key community project of Trinity, is held annually on the first Saturday in May. The Tour features gardens and historic homes, as well as new homes that capture Apalachicola's past. All proceeds are used to maintain Trinity's historic structures.

Improvements made:

- Appreciation Party was held off-site and attended by over 100 people.
 Catered Tex-Mex was a big hit.
- Auction added buying options and improved payment procedures.
- Full-color brochure which cost less. Outside printer may give bigger discount if used for all our printing needs: save the date cards, posters, other advertising.
- Greeters continue to be an important part of the day. Assigned substitutes for each shift on tour day in case of no-shows or sickness.
- Hired out various areas of the Tour: set-up/tear-down before and after events (auction, appreciation party, luncheon, breakfast); kitchen help; and two catered events.
- Homeowners hosted greeters in their homes prior to tour day giving additional details about their homes. Intend to ask all homeowners to do this in 2020.
- New position of Liaison-to-Homeowners lent support for chairs by taking on responsibilities.

- Pillars program produced more funding due to marketing and personal contacts by committee chairs. Intend to continue this approach in 2020.
- Signs were updated with plans to continue to make all signs consistent for branding purposes.
- Website was updated without costs.

Treasurer's Report:

Once again, the Historic Apalachicola Home & Garden Tour had another successful year. Although we do not yet have a "final" figure, as we are still waiting for several people to pick up their auction items and for the last few bills to be submitted, we are able to contribute \$35,352.95 to the Trinity Episcopal Church in 2019.

Worship

The worship committee consists of the chairpersons of the different groups that participate in our services. This includes the altar guild, flower guild, lay eucharistic ministers, acolytes, lay readers, and music. This committee assists the rector by meeting with these chairpersons and coordinating the schedules of all aspects of our worship service.

Trinity has obviously experienced several changes this year; significantly an interim rector followed by several substitute priests, and the arrival of a new rector. Regardless of this transitional period, the worship has functioned like a well-oiled machine: everything ran smoothly on Sunday mornings as well as several funerals and other services. Thank go to everyone involved in worship, especially the worship committee, for these "uneventful" services.

Our worship committee consists of chairpersons of Altar Guild (Susan Galloway), Flower Guild (Aglaia Dolan), Acolytes (Patti McCartney), Lay Eucharist Ministers (Gloria Austin), Ushers (Aglaia Dolan), Lectors/Prayers (Candace Springer), and Music/Choir (Randy Mims), and Verger (Brooks Jones).

Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMS): We have two new LEMS, Kirk Hadaway and Penny Marler. We have lost two LEMS, John Crusoe and our beloved Jim Anderson, and we greatly appreciate their service. We currently have eight LEMS who rotate on a monthly basis.

Acolytes: There are five acolytes serving at the 10:30 service and three acolytes who rotate for the 8:00 service. We are always seeking volunteers, especially for 8:00.

Altar Guild: Altar Guild is a group of devoted parishioners who care for the liturgical vessels, linens, and other appointments used in the liturgy. The Guild prepares the Lord's Table for all services, including weddings, funerals, and other special occasions. The Altar Guild purchases linens, vestments, and hangings with memorial gifts and from the income of Genevieve Marshall Endowment Fund. This year, memorial gifts for Susan Clementson allowed us to purchase new custom-made white altar hangings. Dot Hill gave two new wine cruets with the generous memorial gifts for her sister Helen Quackenbush.

Trinity's Guild has ten members: Gloria Austin, Aglaia Dolan, Rennie Edwards, Susan Galloway (Chair), Jane Harris, Peggy Hawkins, T McLain, Nita Morgan, Candace Springer, and Susie Wagoner.
